I convey my sincere thanks & gratitude to our donors, well-wishers, Governing Body members, and staffs for their support, generous contributions, and active involvement.


May the world be an inclusive one and let the children and persons with disabilities live a barrier free life in a non-threatening and non-discriminating environment.



To enhance rehabilitation support for children with disabilities (CwDs), we have conducted Hand-Holding Training sessions through quarterly day care camps. These trainings are multi-dimensional in nature. They provide a nurturing, pen-and-paper-free environment that encourages CwDs to learn and grow at their own pace. At the same time, parents are empowered with practical knowledge and skills, boosting their confidence in supporting their child's development. Community-Based Rehabilitation Workers (CBRWs) also use these sessions to identify and address gaps in their own practices. The themes of the trainings are selected based on the needs expressed by the parents, who actively participate in both the planning and implementation of these sessions.

During the camps, our senior staffs, therapists in association with some resource parents used to demonstrate disability management skills in the area of Physical, Personal, Social and Educational development of children with disabilities. Experienced parents are also support and guide new parents by sharing their experiences and child development practices. Apart from learning, parents have managed tasks such as cooking, serving meals, and cleaning etc.

In this way, we are trying to build a genuine partnership with parents by developing a sense of ownership among them and encouraging them to contribute according to their abilities. This approach was in line with our 'Theory of Change,' which envisions parents as active & contributing members in the process of change.





MENTAL HEALTH SUPPORT





Community Awareness Programme

66 awareness programmes have organized at villages - the participants were CwDs family members, peers & neighbours. The topic of discussion was do's & dont's with CwDs to ensure their social inclusion. Apart from villages, we have also organized awareness programme at ICDS Centre, Health Centre, Govt. Schools etc.



We Celebrate International Week for Deaf People & International Day for Persons with Disabilities in our 4 blocks through Rally, Blood Donation Camp, & Cultural Programme etc. More than 5000 People have participated in these programmes.

CARE & SUPPORT



315 blankets were distributed to under- privileged and marginalized people with disabilities, as part of our winter relief initiative, aimed at helping them to stay protected and comfortable during the cold season.

Festivals are a time of togetherness, celebration and warmth. We believe everyone deserves to feel included and cherished. By providing new clothes to 627 people who were CwDs, PwDs, siblings and their family members, on the occasion of Durga Puja & Eid-ul- Fitar. We try to ensure that no one feels left out during the special time.

Sujata and Sulata's Journey



"We are very happy. With the money we now earn from our jobs, we've started building our own house. Our quality of life has truly changed. There was a time when we couldn't afford proper meals and had to collect wood just to survive. Today, we even have savings in the bank. We thank GBCD for changing our lives."

 Sujata Manki, a hearing-impaired woman from Dhaniakhali Block, Hooghly District Sujata and Sulata Manki, 43-year-old twin sisters from Garolmuri village, have lived most of their lives in silence—both literally and figuratively. Born deaf, their condition went undiagnosed for many years, leaving them disconnected from the world around them. Living with their elderly mother and paralyzed father, the sisters grew up in extreme poverty. They survived by collecting wood, often going to bed hungry. Their turning point came in 2019 when GBCD (Graham Bell Centre for the Deaf) identified them during a community survey. It was clear that they were in urgent need of support—not only for employment but also to break free from the isolation caused by their communication barriers and low self-esteem. GBCD's first step was to help them build functional communication and basic literacy skills. The sisters also began attending monthly meetings for Deaf young people, gaining exposure and support from a community of peers. Additionally, GBCD facilitated their access to government welfare, including the Manobik Pension Scheme.

With their growing confidence and skills, GBCD was able to place Sujata and Sulata at Lead Liquor Pvt. Ltd., a bottling factory, on March 25, 2022. Since then, they have been earning an average monthly income of Rs. 25,000, and their employer has expressed great satisfaction with their performance. Thus, they are thriving for a better life with dignity and togetherness.

Anushree's Journey

Anushree Murmu, a six-year-old girl with speech & hearing Impairment from Balagarh block. At the age of four, an ASHA worker noticed that something was different about her. Concerned about Anushree's development, the worker referred her to GBCD for further support.

Upon assessment, we discovered that Anushree was living with a hearing impairment, developmental delays, and signs of malnutrition. Though she was enrolled in the local ICDS program, she lacked age-appropriate knowledge, had never used hearing aids, and remained disconnected from vital government support services. Her parents, both daily wage earners, were doing their best—but they needed help to support her.

GBCD began by counseling Anushree's parents and helping them understands her condition and potential. We arranged for a suitable hearing aid and started regular speech therapy sessions, both at our clinic and through home-based support provided by our Community-Based Rehabilitation Worker (CBRW).

Empowerment of the parents was a crucial step. We trained them in simple yet effective

techniques like the Conversation Method and using of real objects as Learning Teaching-Materials (LTMs) to encourage communication at home. Through multiple hand holding trainings, they began to gain confidence in their ability to support Anushree's growth and development. At the school level, we introduced child-to-child program designed to create a supportive peer environment for Anushree. Teachers were trained in deaf-friendly teaching methods, and classroom demonstrations helped make learning more inclusive for her. Today, Anushree's world looks very different. She can now express her basic needs using distorted but intelligible speech and responds to spoken instructions from her parents. She attends school regularly, plays happily with her peers, and has begun to recognize and write important personal details like her name, address, and the names of body parts. Anushree secured first position in the advancement to class - I. Her enrollment for the UDID card has been completed, and she is now receiving support through the Manabik pension scheme. Anushree's journey is still unfolding, but she is no longer held back by silence. With the right kind of support from GBCD as well as of the family, she is finding her voice—and her place in the world.
